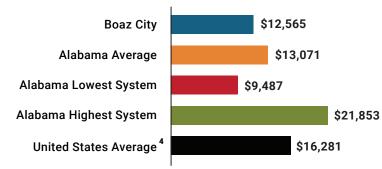

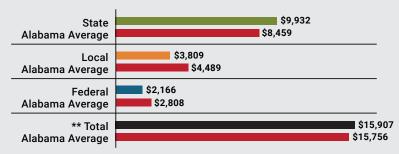

How was your school system funded?¹

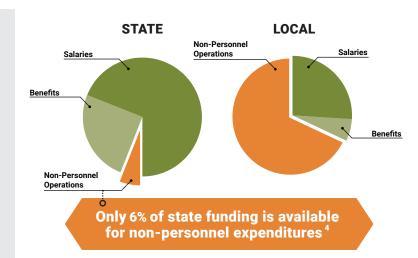


School System Spending

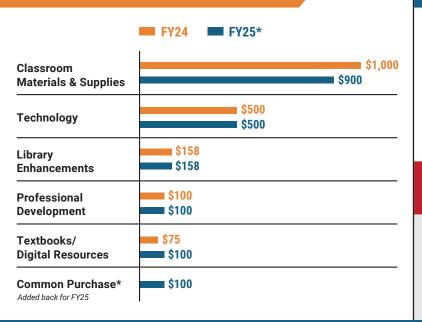
