

# OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 67



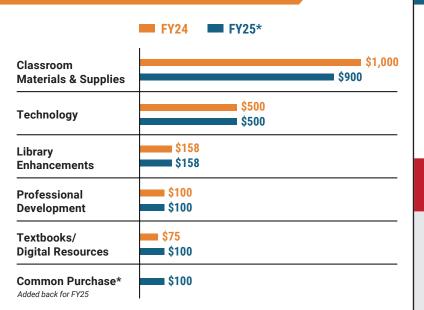
