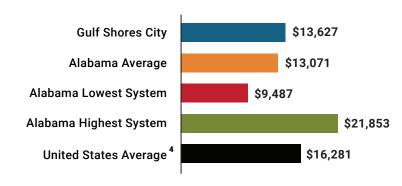

#### How was your school system funded?1

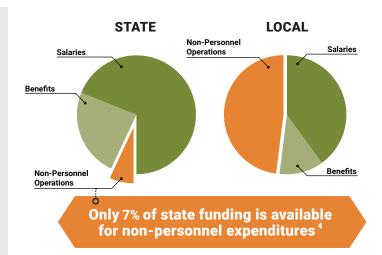

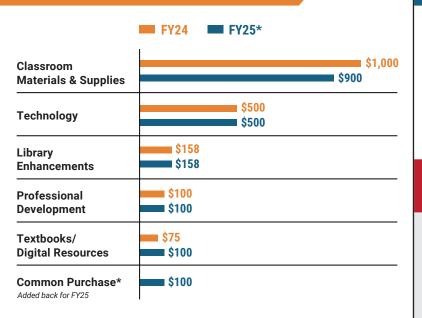
