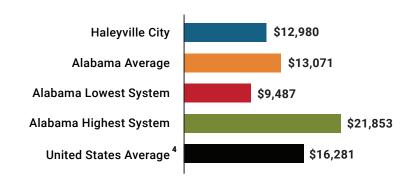

Haleyville City Revenue Sources

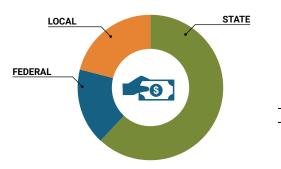


# OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 99

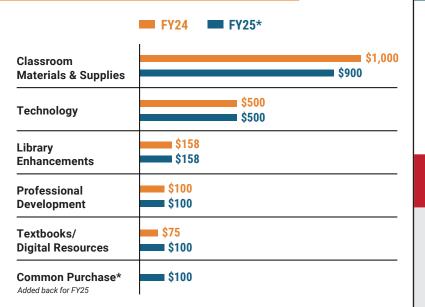
