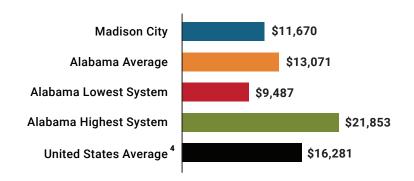

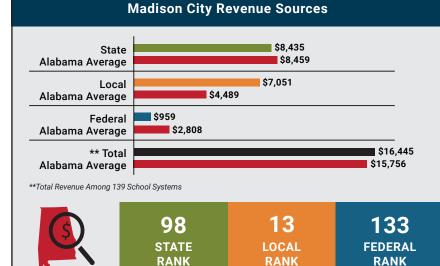

Per-Pupil Revenue Sources

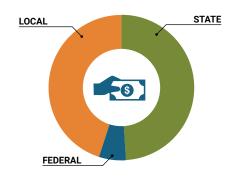


OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 49

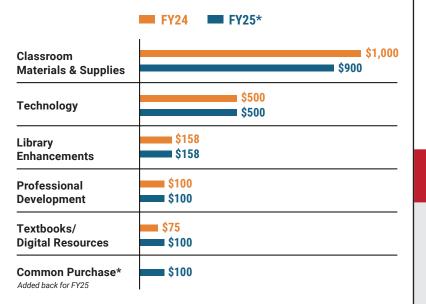
