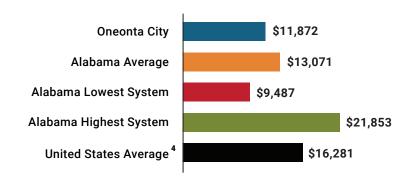

Per-Pupil Revenue Sources



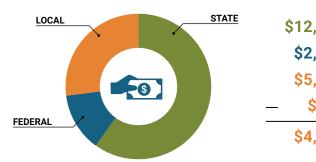


OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 127

How did your school system spend state & local dollars?¹

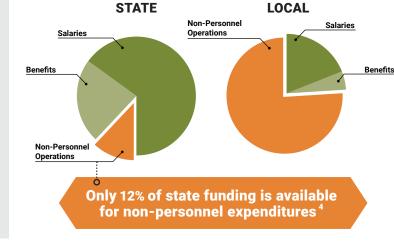

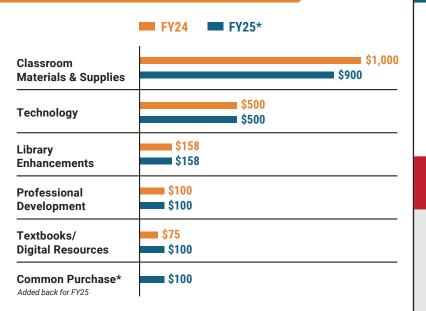
