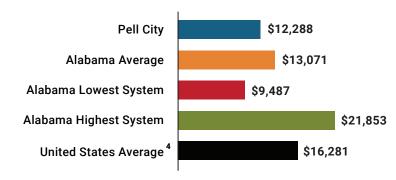

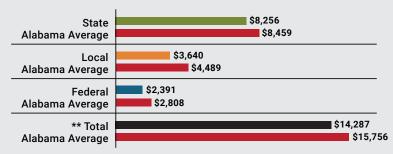

How was your school system funded?¹



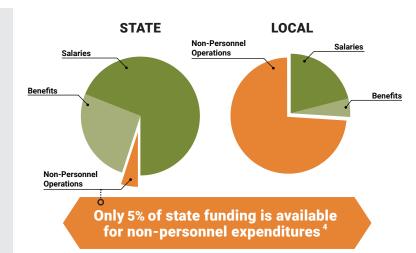
School System Spending

How did your school system spend state & local dollars?¹

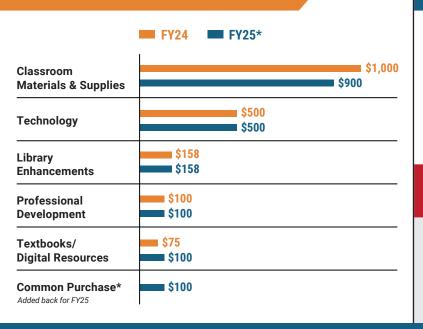
