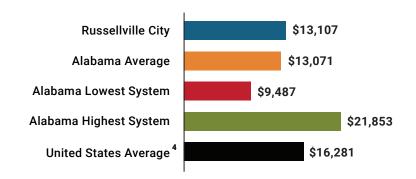

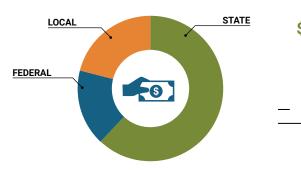


OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 96

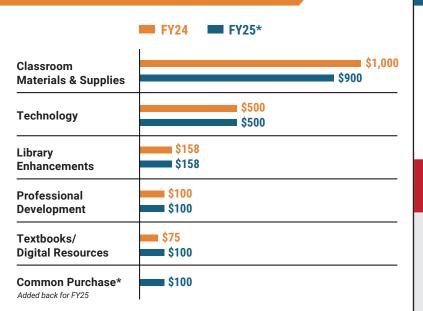

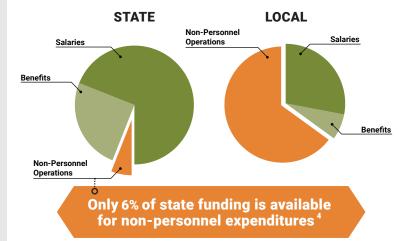
