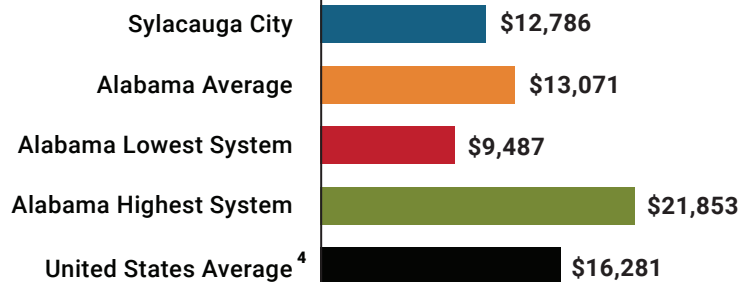

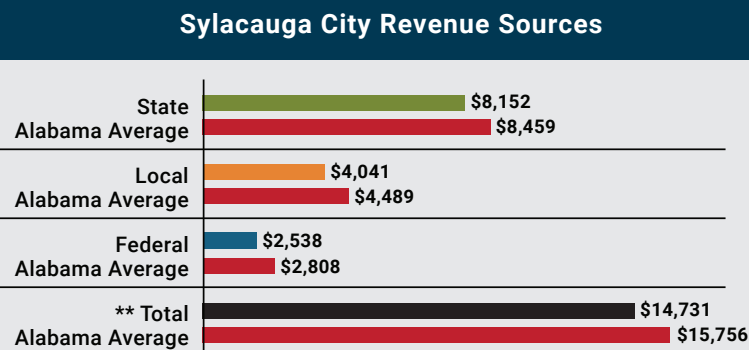

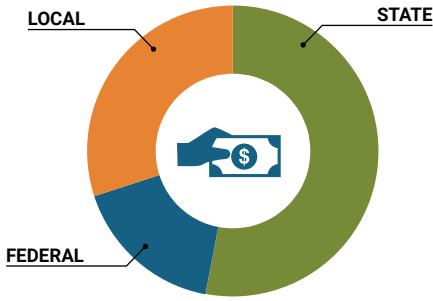

VALUE OF 1-MILL For Your School System

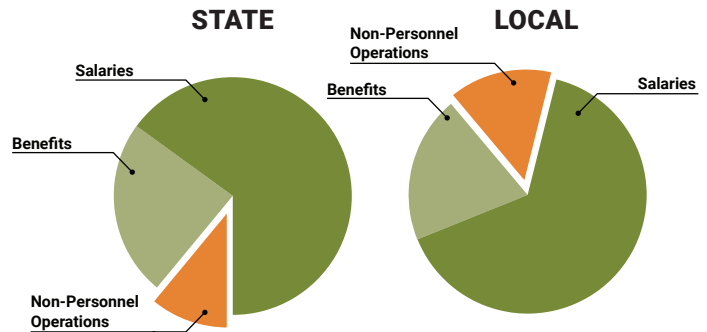

How did your school system spend state & local dollars?¹

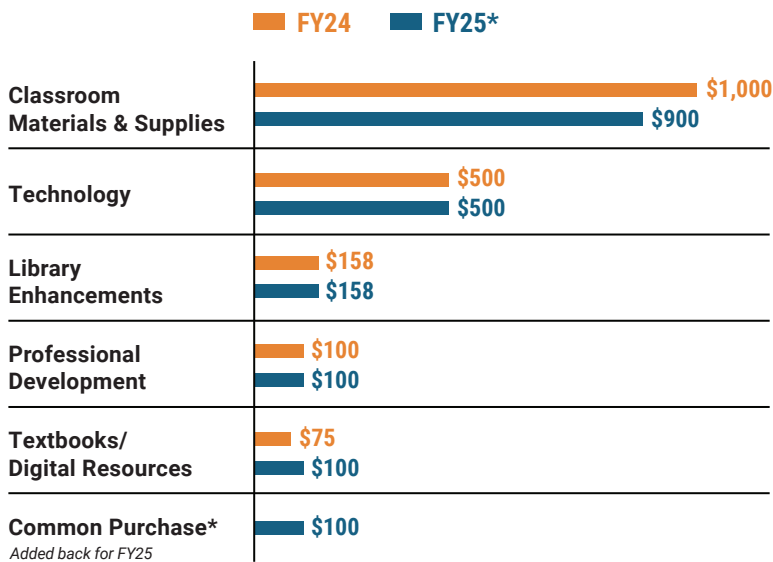

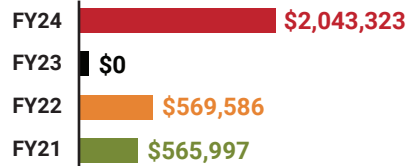
