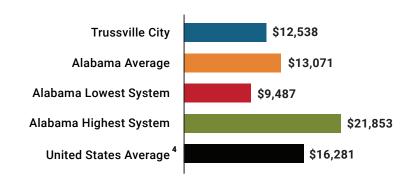

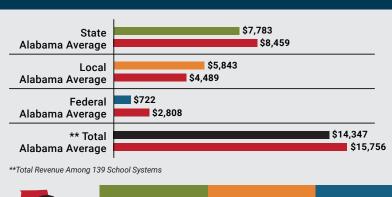

Trussville City Revenue Sources

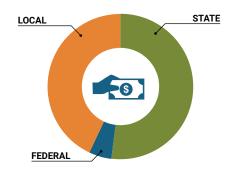


OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 106

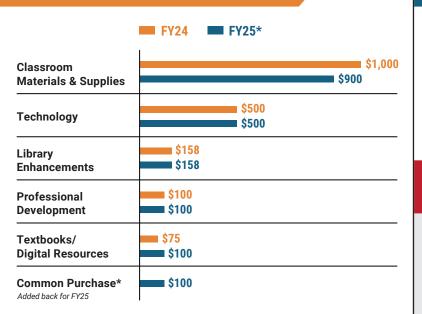
