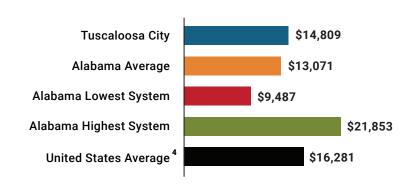

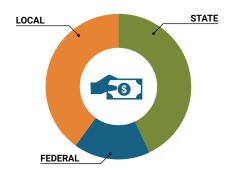


# OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 35

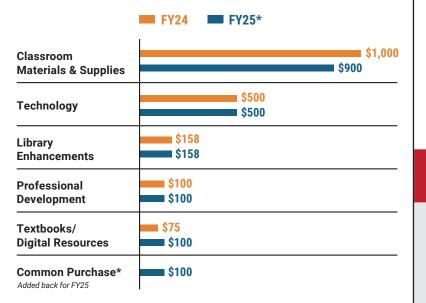
