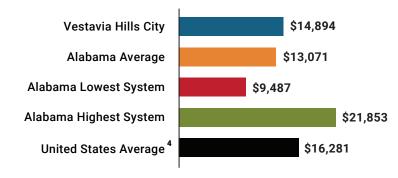

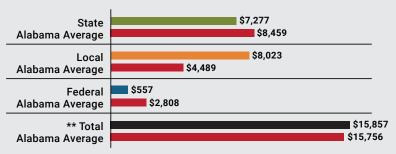

How was your school system funded?¹

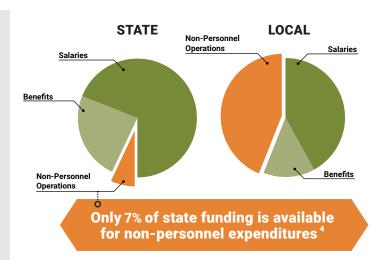

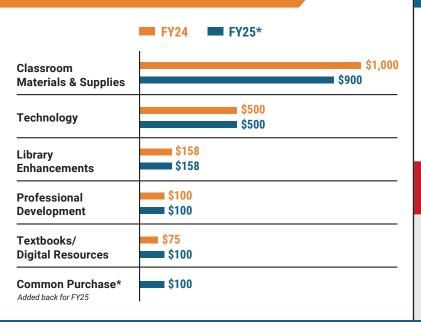
How did your school system spend state & local dollars?¹
