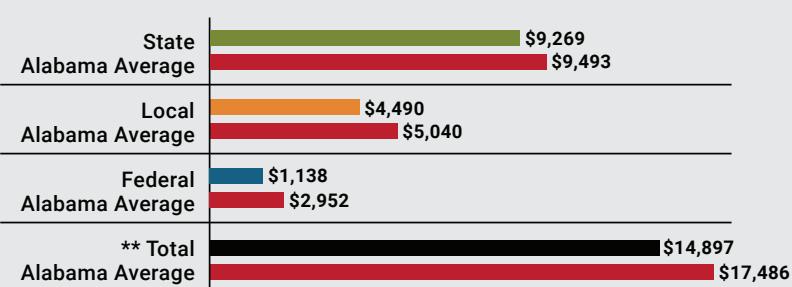

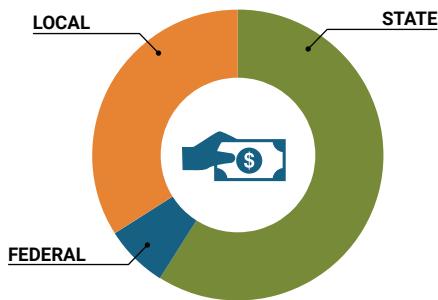

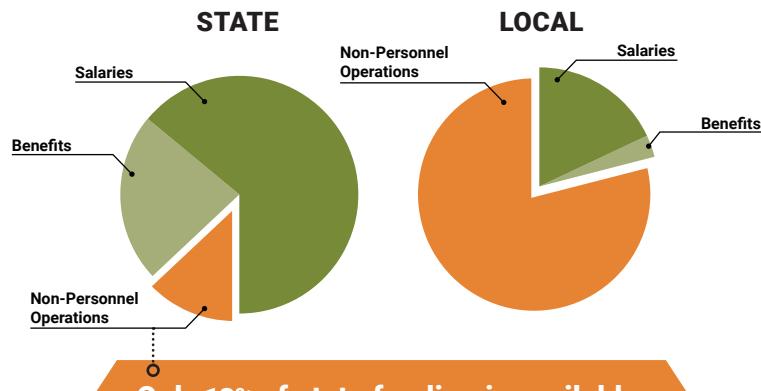

## How did your school system spend state & local dollars?<sup>1</sup>



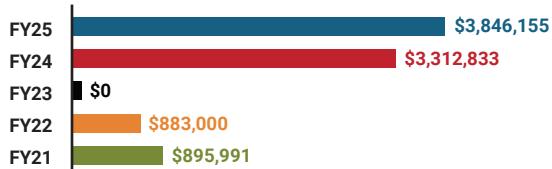
